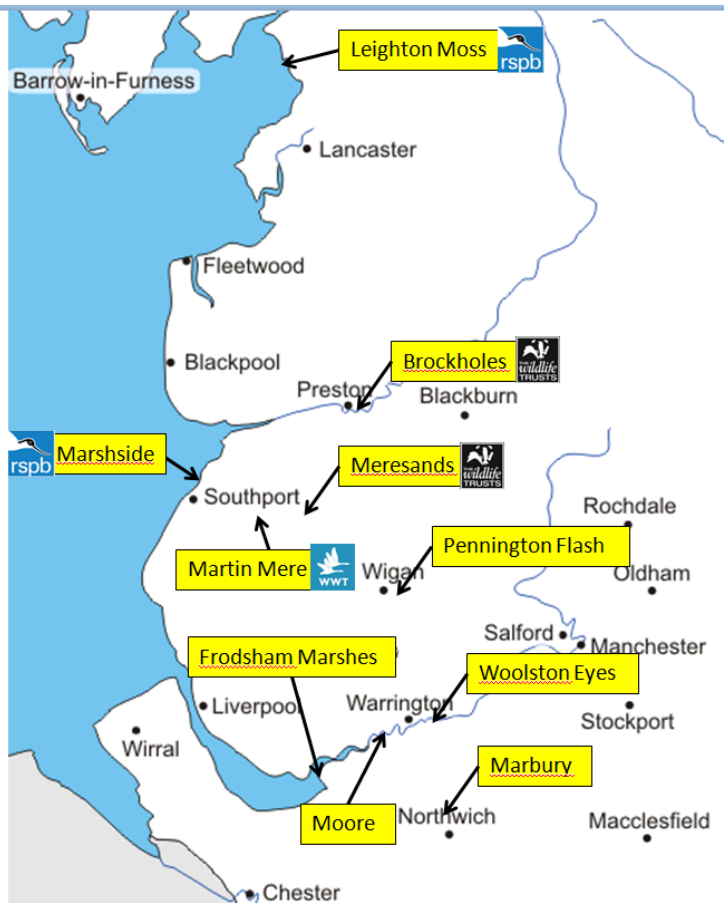
The Wirral
